Mr Gary Lyne of our TAS Faculty continues to be an inspiring mentor for all our IT students, junior and senior.

We are immensely thrilled too that our senior IT students have been able to meet with Mr Wayne Houlden, CEO of the cutting edge software company Janison, which is one of our local Jetty businesses. This contact allows our boys to interact with industry experts, and to have the benefit of high quality expert feedback on their projects. The Jetty precinct is increasingly a creative hub, and we are proud to be part of it.

Term 3 is also planning time. Students in Years 8 and 9 choose elective subjects, and Year 10 finalise their pathways for senior years. All this determines how we build the teaching timetable for 2015, and tells us what extra staffing needs we may have. In addition, this year we need to create our school plan for the next three-year cycle, 2015–2017. The Department of Education has determined that all schools will use a newly designed planning model for this. Like all other New South Wales schools, we have received welcome additional money because of the State government's wise decision to accept the principles of the Gonski funding model; our crucial priority now is to direct those new resources to areas of greatest need, and to ensure that we are able to demonstrate the positive benefits of our decisions.

#### IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR ADOLESCENT GIRLS

It is recommended that all girls in Years 7 and 9 participate in the National Self-Detection Program for Scoliosis (NSDP) during August. The Self-Detection Brochure for Scoliosis can be accessed on their website home page at <u>www.scoliosis-australia.org</u>.

Scoliosis (spinal curvature) is an important health problem for adolescent girls and 25 per 1,000 are at risk of developing a significant curve. Three girls per 1,000 require active treatment (spinal brace or surgery). In the early stages the condition is most often asymptomatic; screening in the age range 11 to 13 years is a sound preventative health measure.

The website contains comprehensive credible information about the symptoms and treatment of scoliosis. Through the forum, girls and their parents can obtain general advice from certified specialists who manage patients with spinal curvature.

#### Bangarra Rekindling Program

Eleven Aboriginal students have been participating in the Bangarra Rekindling Program during July and August. This program has involved students working with Bangarra dancers Kirk Page and Chantal Kerr over three Gatherings, culminating in a public performance at Jetty Theatre on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> August.

Students travelled to cultural sites with Uncle Mark Flanders then interpreted the sights, sounds and stories of those locations into movement, eventually developing a choreographic piece. The students said they have learned 'how to express their feelings through dance' and use their experiences to put together a dance performance. The boys' dance is very physical and incorporates boomerang throwing and animal movements, while the girls' dance is more graceful with movements representing food gathering and painting up with ochre.

This has been a challenging and rewarding program and our students have really enjoyed developing their dance skills, listening to elders and learning more about Gumbaynggirr culture. The Friday performance showcased the skills students have learned over the three Gatherings and featured the support act, 'Garlambirla Jarjums', who danced and sang 'My Island Home'. The performers have already been invited to perform at Harmony Day next March!











#### Launch of Garlambirla Youth Theatre

All Drama students will soon automatically become part of our school-based **Garlambirla Youth Theatre**. This will be launched in late August with performances of *Stolen* by Jane Harrison and *Yanagai Yanagai* by Andrea James.

These plays will be performed and produced by Year 9 Drama classes, who have been busily rehearsing and designing technical aspects for their show, which will finalise their unit of study on Indigenous Theatre. ### ENGLISH FACULTY

The English Faculty continues to offer a wide variety of activities to help support and extend the students. Here are just a few of what has, or will, happen in Term 3:-

- Public speaking see separate article.
- Debating see separate article.
- Excursion to Sydney to see Bell Shakespeare's production of 'Macbeth' and participate in a master-class on the play.
- Select students in Years 9 and 10 to attend the North Coast Creative Writing camp in Week 9, Term 3.

#### TECHNOLOGY UPDATE

The English Department has purchased six iPads for students to use for group creation tasks such as videos, book trailers and presentations. Both students and teachers are enjoying this new resource and the work being produced is of a high quality. The best work will be showcased on our new YouTube Channel and on the school website. We also have access now to a trolley of 16 laptops for use in the classroom rather than heading out to a computer lab. The laptops will be used for a variety of functions including research, creative projects and publishing student work.

#### TERM 3 — UNITS OF WORK

#### Year 7 – 'Cultural Heritage'

A trip through time and different cultures, will allow students to explore storytelling and the myths and legends that have shaped different communities. Students have a learning journal as well as a learning passport to complete.

#### Year 8 – 'Power'

Students are studying what constitutes power and the types of power that can be found in society. There will be a specific focus on the power of persuasion, especially in regards to advertising and the media. They will study a novel or short stories as well as look at documentaries and films in order to build their understanding of the concept of power. Students will design an advertisement as their assessment task as well as write a WHY paragraph explaining their choices.

#### Year 9 – 'Discord and Harmony'

Students are looking at conflict – what types, what causes it, and, more importantly, how it can be resolved. The literature focus is drama with some classes studying 'Romeo and Juliet' and others studying the Australian play 'Stolen'. The assessment task will be an essay so students will spend time on their essay writing skills, especially on the use of the WHY structure.

#### Year 10 – 'How far will you go?'

Students are looking at ambition and how far people are willing to go to get what they want. They will look at both the positives and negatives of ambition through a study of either 'Macbeth' or 'Property of the Clan'. Their assessment task is an essay and time will be spent in class on building student's skills in this important area.

#### Southern Cross University Research Project — building essay writing skills

Years 9 and 10 students are involved in a research project with Tom Gyenes from Southern Cross University exploring how best to build students' ability to construct sound arguments in preparation for essay writing. Different classes are trialing online tools that will allow for logical planning of arguments as well as enable collaboration so ideas and arguments can be built across the whole group. All classes will be using a common terminology and process around the development of "argumentation" and the defending of an opinion. With both year groups having to complete an essay for their assessment task, we were happy to accommodate the project as we can see the immediate benefit for our students.

#### Legacy Public Speaking Success!

Congratulations to **Lisa Macdonald**, Year 8, who has won the Mid North Coast Legacy Public Speaking Competition. Bishop Druitt College hosted the event and included is a passage from their bulletin that perfectly sums up Lisa's achievement on the day.

"We were lucky to have a very strong contender from Coffs Harbour High in Lisa Macdonald, who demonstrated to perfection how to approach an impromptu speech. Those who heard her would have been in no doubt, since equal weighting is given to the prepared and the impromptu, about who was the deserving winner of the competition. She was very poised, perceived the wider meaning in the topic "Easy come, easy go", and finished her two minute delivery on the bell with sound reasoning and good illustration. At the conclusion, all the adults in the room were vastly relieved we did not have to measure ourselves against her on the day. Sensational."

Lisa will head to Sydney later in the year to compete in the State final and we wish her continued success!

**Hayley Millington**, Year 8, also competed in the final and her prepared speech was excellent, certainly seeing her finish in the top four competitors for that section of the competition. Well done Hayley!

#### How can students improve their writing?

Recent assessment tasks have shown that our students have great ideas and have understood the concepts that have been explored in class. However, how those ideas are conveyed is just as important and this term we are focusing on making sure students become more responsible for drafting and editing their work for errors in grammar, punctuation and spelling as well as trying to be more effective in their choice of vocabulary. Parents can assist their child with this process by helping students to identify the errors in their writing (both class and assessment tasks), underlining words that could be improved upon and encouraging them to draft their work. The handout included here is a good conversation starter in terms of what students should be doing to improve the quality of their writing.

I am an awesome writer I am learning to use surface and deeper writing features to become an awesome writer ... Surface Features Use full stops at the end of sentences. Use capital letters for names, places and at the beginning of sentences. Use speech marks for any dialogue. Use the correct tense throughout. Spell many commonly used words correctly. Use chunks, spelling rules and 'stretching out' to spell unfamiliar words. Find words in a number of spelling sources – including dictionaries. Proof read my work to make sure it makes sense. Deeper Features Plan my writing using a planning framework. Sequence my ideas. Use the correct tense throughout. Write short and long sentences. Join sentences using a variety of conjunctions. Write complex sentences. Read my work to the class, a group or buddy.

- Revise and improve my writing based on the suggestions of others.
- Use descriptive language to make my writing come alive.
- Use different sentence beginnings.

Term 3 has been extremely busy for Languages. Our new Chinese teaching assistant, Ms Yaqiong Wang, arrived at our school at the beginning of week 2 and has settled in well. Yaqiong is placed in our school as part of our Confucius Classroom Program and is fully funded by the Chinese Government. Ms Wang is assisting Mrs Burnham and Mr Dun with team teaching in some of our elective classes and in some Year 8 classes. Ms Wang is from Shanxi province in China and is already a valuable addition to our faculty.

We have hosted two groups of Chinese visitors as part of our ongoing collaboration with Southern Cross University. July is a popular time for Chinese students to come to Australia on study tours, as it marks the summer holidays in China. The 37 students that visited our school were able to attend lessons, participate in cultural activities and were provided with the opportunity to get to know our staff and students over morning tea. Congratulations to our Year 10 elective class for being so welcoming toward our visitors. These students have demonstrated that they possess the school's core values of: Co-operation, Commitment, Courtesy and Care.

By dinner we were in Jindabyne and the 'all-nighters' had finally started feeling the effects of sleep deprivation and everybody wanted nothing more than to lie down and sleep in an actual bed. It was the quietest we had been all day and the teachers welcomed the quiet because sure enough it wasn't going to last.

Day one out on the slopes — no matter how hard I try, I'll never truly be able to explain to you the feeling of seeing snow for the first time. For those who have had the experience you know what I'm talking about. For those who haven't, I can only pray that one day you'll get the chance to experience what I did.

Jumping off the ski tube and stepping out and just seeing a white mass of landscape stretched out before you is a feeling you'll never forget. A smile plastered every kids face; I had to crouch down and grab a handful just to make sure the stuff was real. And yes, it was real. I am almost 100% sure I wasn't imagining my numb hand.

Lessons started and that's when the real fun began. As a skier I can only speak for about a quarter of my fellow peers when I say that skiing is sooooo much fun! But since I was given the job to recount our snow adventure I had to take the time to ask a few of my snowboarding mates what it was really like for them.

People tried to explain the feeling of going down the mountain to me. Emphasis the word **try**. That's the thing about this trip. I for one was lost for words and now I'm trying to put into words the joy and the happiness and every other emotion I felt, as well as what the rest of Year 9 felt throughout this experience, and get those feelings across to you, so you may, however so slightly, understand all the hidden meaning, the truth and the emphasis when we say this trip was brilliant.

Some people describe racing down that run for the first time by saying that it was as if their heart was in their throat. Words like fun, exhilarating and amazing have been thrown around in conversations, but what really caught my attention was a single word that explains it all so simply. Going down that mountain makes you feel **alive**. Whether on a board or skis, the adrenaline pumping through your veins the moment you lean forward and let gravity take you; when all that's left is your blurred vision, the wind in your ears and the skis on your feet. To lose yourself in the moment is what it means to live, to be alive.

Many kids, like me, don't get to travel. They don't get to go anywhere overly special. They don't get to see new places and experience new things. They don't get to venture that far outside of their comfort zones until they come on trips like this.

It is times like these we're most vulnerable. It is times when what we call normal and what we call easy are pushed aside, that we see a different person, a better version of ourselves.

We see someone braver, someone willing to try new things; to speak to someone outside their friends group, to try new food, or to sleep in a different bed. Our emotions are easier seen to those around us and we feel naked being so exposed in a way we are usually so guarded. While we are vulnerable like this we must remember being vulnerable does not make us weak.

I asked Year 9 what they liked best about this excursion. The answer I liked the most was, getting to know each other a little bit better. Friends that thought they knew all the ins and outs of one another and kids that had shared a conversation of no more than five syllables all learnt a little bit more about each other. Because of that we become closer as a year group. And a closer year group means a closer school community. Getting to know each other a little bit better. Getting to know the real you. The real people you call friends.

By the third day we were starting to feel it. We were tired. We were sore. And tempers were running high. It did not take much for someone to snap. A friend of mine snowboarded. She said boarding was really fun and her words of wisdom were this. *Some days are challenging; but some days it's worth the pain.* 

In PD/H/PE we talk about being resilient. About getting back up after life's challenges push you down. We all had our moments. Over the week, at one point in time or another we would find ourselves alone for a moment. Nothing but you and your conscience — when the falls you took, the headache you had and the home sickness you had all started catching up to you. You forget that everyone else around you is having these moments. The moments when you fall down and feel like staying down; because it's easier than getting back up. You could feel that old self creeping back up on you. The one that said no; when things got too hard, the one that wanted to give up.

And that's when we have to carry on. So many times I heard friends comforting friends saying that *if you give up now you'll regret it later*. And they are right. I guess that is why we have friends to point out the obvious when we are in too much of a state to see it ourselves.

It takes courage and confidence to ski and to snowboard. It takes courage as you pick up speed when heading down a run. It takes confidence in yourself, your body and your instructor to push any anxiety, any fear, away. To tell yourself you *can* do it, and to start down that hill. That confidence could be seen as a web. A web that is crafted together over the minutes and hours and days you spend on the snow. We all had falls, some worse than others. Those falls either build that web of confidence or completely obliterate it. Once that web is gone, the choice is yours. Start again, or give up.

I took a fall. I couldn't stop and I did nothing but build up speed and scream from the top of my lungs as I zipped down that run until I came crashing to a not so graceful stop at the bottom. Thankfully I didn't hurt myself but it was enough to wipe that perfect picture of a skiing superstar clean out of my head. The falling itself wasn't the cause of my shattered confidence. It was the feeling of having absolutely no control. I am not a thrill seeker, nor will I ever be, so I wasn't familiar with the feeling you get when you lose hold of the reins and control is no where in sight.

I had a choice — to start over, or give up. So I got back up. I got up and started gluing the pieces back together. In free time I would go back to the bunny slopes and perfect my stops, then work my way up to turns, then bigger runs. By the end of the next day I was at the strongest I had been all week. My web of courage and confidence was back better than before and I was ready to tackle whatever was thrown at me. I watched as others around me mended their broken confidence much the same way I did. Some took longer than others but we all got there in the end and that is the important thing.

I am proud of my year group and proud to be a part of it. We are an amazing group of individuals. We are more unified now, more attached to each other. We have opened up to teachers and to friends and they have opened up to us. Every time we fell down we got back up. We helped those that could not do it by themselves, or could, but did not realise that they had it in them.

On behalf of Year 9, I would like to thank the teachers. I would like to thank you for packing up and leaving your families to be with us, giving us the opportunity of a life time. Thank you for sharing it with us, for making it possible. And thanks to all of Year 9. It is safe to say there is no one else quiet like us and without everyone's participation; this excursion would not have been half as fun.

Everyone has taken something different away from this experience. We have gained friends, shared jokes, mastered a new skill and had fun. The most important thing to remember though is NEVER GIVE UP!

## TAS FACULTY

#### SENIOR ROBOT BOYS

Last term, our Senior Robot Boys (Davis Howlett, Max Tavener and Alex Spiteri-Albon) won the school student division of the NSW iAwards competition with their project AUSRAID. AUSRAID is a hexacopter designed to search for persons missing overboard from commercial ships. It incorporates three on-board cameras, an infra-red sensor, GPS location sensor, altitude and gyroscope sensors in its search for the survivors.

The boys have been invited to the National iAwards Competition to be held in Melbourne at the end of this month. The National iAwards Competition has been described as the "Oscars of the ICT Industry." Alex, Davis and Max are currently completing modifications to the original design, to make AUSRAID lighter, easier to fly and improve its search capabilities. At the National Competition, the boys will only have 15 minutes to present their project to a panel of judges. The judges will then have 10 minutes to fire questions at the boys regarding the design, purpose, technical aspects, marketing and the future prospects for their project. The judges are usually leaders from within the ICT industry, institutions, entrepreneurial educational and business sectors from around Australia.

#### JUNIOR ROBOT BOYS

Yes, Coffs High also has a Junior Robot Boys team. Year 9 students Luke Croak, Josh Sechi, Patrick O'Gorman and Peter McKenzie have teamed up and entered a project in the NSW division of the Young ICT Explorers Competition. They will present their project at the University of NSW next weekend. Their project is called "PACE", which stands for **P**rosthetic **A**rm **C**ontrolled by an **E**eg.

PACE is based around bio-mechanical engineering concepts, where the user wears a small EEG device on their head (similar to a rigid head-band). This device transmits brainwave activity via Bluetooth to an Arduino programmable micro-processor. The Arduino board is connected to a small robotic arm that can be "controlled" by specific brainwave activity. The end result for "PACE" is that a person who has lost the use of their arms can control the robotic arm to feed themselves, take medications, drink fluids, etc. Their project demonstrates that the concept does work and the boys are currently putting the finishing touches to the final prototype. Their display at the YICTE Competition will include two concept prototypes, posters, business cards complete with QR Code, fridge magnets and scrolling LED signage. They have also set up a website where further information on the project can be viewed.

# Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) in 2014

#### What is BYOD?

In 2014 Coffs Harbour High School will be allowing students to bring their own device (BYOD) to school. BYOD has been developed to enable students to bring their devices to school to be used in an education setting. This means that students can either purchase a new device or bring a preowned device to be used in class in an educational context. It is important to note that participation in BYOD remains optional.

As a component of BYOD, Coffs Harbour High School has revised our Technology Policy. This will mean that in Term 1 in 2014 all students will be required to sign the Technology Agreement that covers use of school owned Department of Education and Communities (DEC) equipment and includes BYOD devices in school.

It is because BYOD is being conducted in an educational setting that <u>THE FOLLOWING DEVICES</u> <u>ARE NOT PERMITTED UNDER BYOD</u>:

Smart phone 
iPod 
MPS

#### **Conditions of BYOD:**

- Students will be required to sign a Technology Charter
- Students participating in BYOD will be required to have a laptop bag with a padded area designated to carry the laptop or tablet.
- Students will also need a protective case.
- Student devices are required to meet our minimum specifications which relate to hardware, software, device size and if purchasing a new device; wireless capability.

Not all devices will be able to connect to our wireless system. If you intend to purchase a device for use in the school please take the hardware and software specifications with you when you make your purchase to ensure that the device is compatible with the school wireless.

#### **BYOD Device Software**

The NSW Department of Education and Communities has negotiated an agreement with Microsoft so that from early 2014, **school and TAFE students** will be able to install **selected software** for free on their BYOD device including Microsoft Office.

A contract has also been signed with Adobe for Student BYOD software. The new enterprise agreement includes all current and future versions of:-

- Creative Suite
  - (Design & Web Premium, Master Collection)
- Presenter
- Captivate
- Photoshop Elements

- Premier Elements
- Connect
- Muse (simple website creator)
- Edge Animate

More information about the agreements, and how to make use of them, will be provided to you when the process is complete.

#### **Device Specifications**

#### Hardware Requirements

#### Tablets:

- Keyboard a tablet device must have a separate keyboard other than the onscreen keyboard.
- Screen Size minimum 10"
- Battery life at least 6 hours

#### Laptops:

- Weight: maximum of 2.5 kilos
- Screen Size: minimum 10" recommended maximum 15"
- Battery life: at least 6 hours

NB: All Students carrying any technology must have a laptop bag and case. All students carrying Technology are responsible for that technology.

#### System Specs:

- ✓ Microsoft Windows 7 or newer
- ✓ Apple Mac OS X 10.6 or newer
- ✓ Apple iOS 6 or newer
- ✓ Microsoft Windows for Surface RT or newer

#### Wireless Specs: Wireless N, 5 GHz

High School wireless works on the 5 Gigahertz (GHz) range on the N wireless standard. This is not the same frequency as most smart phones, home and business wireless systems. These work on wireless G band. This means that any device trying to see the school wireless will **need to have** wireless N and be on 5 GHz range. Some wireless N devices may be marketed as "dual band" (meaning the device can use both 2.4 and 5 GHz).

#### Wireless N capable

Wireless capable does not guarantee that the device is going to work on the 5 GHz range. Many wireless N devices are 2.4 GHz and will not work on 5GHz wireless. If you want to connect to the school wireless, you must ensure that your device has the following wireless specifications:

Device must have 802.11n on 5GHz which can also be known as Dual Band, 802.11abgn, 802.11agn or 802.11ac. NOTE: b.g.n wireless is not 5 GHz however if the specs contain an 'a', for example 802.11 a,g,n this will be wireless N 5 GHz. Wireless 'a' is 5 GHz.

If you own an existing device that will not connect to the school wireless, ask the retailer about a USB adapter that may be able to boost devices to the Wireless N 5 GHz range (eg. wireless AC dual band USB adapter). A micro adapter is more expensive but is much smaller.

#### Additional Recommendations:

- Minimum RAM 4GB
- Accidental loss and breakage insurance

- Microsoft OneNote or equivalent
- Virus protection software (eg. Windows devices: Microsoft Forefront Endpoint Protection free, and for Apple devices: ClamXav 2 Sentry)

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
