#### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

On Tuesday this week the school welcomed the Minister for Education and Early Childhood Sarah Mitchell, the Minister for Mental Health, Regional Youth and Women, Bronwyn Taylor and the local member for Coffs Harbour Gurmesh Singh. The Ministers and Mr Singh were in Coffs Harbour visiting four schools. The Director Educational Leadership Coffs Harbour, Jenny Murray accompanied the politicians.

Our visitors were welcomed in language by Aboriginal Education Officer Merv Bolt and Year 8 students Ethan Hart and Hayley Davis. They were accompanied on their classroom visits by the student leadership team – Joshua Milne, Emma Chaffey, Liam Snell and Megan Dodd.

As one focus area for the current Royal Commission into Disability is education, we invited Minister Mitchell to look at three ways our school supports students with a disability. We visited our specialist class for students with a mild intellectual disability and explained how the students moved to and from mainstream classes depending on the subjects and their individual strengths with the aim of full integration by Year 9 or 10.

We visited a mainstream class, which includes students with hearing and vision needs and discussed the technology and specialist teacher support, which assists classroom teachers to make the necessary adjustments for learning. We also visited a space in the library we call the Lighthouse Learning Space where students requiring one on one support attend for one or more lessons per day depending on their individual needs. It was great that in all three locations students and teachers were able to speak personally with the Minister.

### FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

We are proud of Year 12 who are currently sitting HSC exams which continue until the 11<sup>th</sup> of November. It can be a stressful time for some students and we reinforce personal best but also taking care of yourselves with nutrition, sleep and physical activity as well as study. We hope to see all Year 12 students and their parents at the Formal on 12<sup>th</sup> November. Tickets are available at the office.

This means of course, that we have transitioned Year 11 into the beginning of their Year 12 studies this term and students have been supported with subject guidance and provided with assessment details for the year ahead. It is very important that students get organised early and stay on top of their assessments as each subject will generally only have four tasks, including the Trial Exams held in August 2020. These assessments contribute to 50% of their final HSC marks in most subjects. Doing well in school tasks can set students up positively for their exams and place them in a strong position to do their best. We have also spoken with students about ensuring that they attend every class as all course work is able to be included in the final exams next year. If students are absent from school, it is their responsibility to catch up on missed work.

Term 4 can be a fun time for students with additional camps (Year 10 and 11); leadership experiences (Year 9) and reward excursions, together with the end of year activities, which teachers are currently planning. We reminded students on assembly recently that they need to maintain a high standard of behaviour and show respect and kindness to each other, as well as following school rules and directions from teachers if they are to be eligible to attend excursions. Students who are on Deputy level monitoring cards are generally not eligible to attend excursions and any student with over 15 negative behaviour entries this year will not be eligible for the reward excursion.

The school will be undergoing maintenance work in multiple areas, with large works replacing doors in the hall, an awning joining the library, replacement areas of concrete and some painting. Areas will be fenced off during construction and there will be room changes for students. The main office area will not be affected at this stage.

#### **AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITIONS**

The Australian Mathematics Competition results are in! Of the 21 entrants in this years competition, 14 students achieved a Credit or higher. Congratulations goes to all students who entered.

To achieve a High Distinction certificate, the student must be in the top 3% of their year and region. This year we have two students to receive this award. Sam Woolford in Year 9 achieved a 97 percentile rank and Oscar Woolford in Year 10 scored a remarkable 99 percentile rank.

To achieve a Distinction certificate, the student should not have received a higher award but maintains a position in the top 20% .The only recipient of the award in 2019 is Aiden Wilson in Year 8.

The Credit award had our largest number of students achieving at this level. To receive this certificate the student maintains a position in the top 55% for Year 7 to 10 and 60% for Year 11 and 12 of their year and region.

#### NSW CHS ATHLETICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Athletes from Coffs Harbour High School travelled to Sydney to compete at the NSWCHS Athletics Championships held from  $5^{th} - 8^{th}$  September. Nineteen athletes made up the team competing in 28 events overall. Our team achieved outstanding results bringing home 10 medals, 5 Gold, 1 Silver and 4 bronze medals.

The 14 years boys relay team, consisting of Ama Mite, Cayden Close, Emmanual Degle and Oscar Croak won a bronze medal coming 3<sup>rd</sup> place with a time of 47.9 seconds.

The 12 years girls relay team, consisting of Paige Dun, Senimelia Toroca, Teliesha Whiley and Cheyanne Wilson ran well coming 7<sup>th</sup> in the heat and 15<sup>th</sup> overall.

Jack Sheehan placed 4<sup>th</sup> in the 14 years boys individual point score, competing in 7 events. Jack won gold in the 100m hurdles (13.41secs) and the 200m hurdles (26.58 secs). Jack just missed out in the 100m final coming in 4th place with a time of 11.64secs! In the field events Jack placed 5<sup>th</sup> in High Jump and 8<sup>th</sup> place in shot put and triple jump. Well done Jack!

Hayley Kitching's training also paid off in the 800m event where she defended her championship from 2018 and placed 1<sup>st</sup> winning a gold medal with a PB of 2.15secs. In the 400m she smashed her best time by a full second with a time of 57.94 seconds to secure a silver medal. Congratulations Hayley.

Olissa Onley placed 5<sup>th</sup> in the individual point score for the 15 years girls, which is a fantastic result. Ollisa set out to run a PB coming 1<sup>st</sup> place, winning gold in the 1500m event with a time of 4.44.2 secs. In the 800m she just missed out on a medal coming in 4<sup>th</sup> place (2.21.3secs). Georgia Kuchel competed in the High Jump event, jumping a height of 1.60m and winning a gold medal. Congratulations Georgia.

#### NSW ALL SCHOOLS ATHLETIC CHAMPIONSHIPS.

On the first weekend of the school holidays our elite athletes competed at NSW All Schools Athletic Championships held at Sydney Olympic Park on September 26<sup>th</sup>-29<sup>th</sup>. The team members included Jade Kitching, Hayley Kitching, Olissa Onley, Alyssa Jenkins, Sophie Walsh and Georgia Kuchel. Jack Sheehan unfortunately pulled out due to injury.

Congratulations to Jade Kitching who came 2nd in New South Wales in the boys 13 yrs 1500m with a personal best time of 4:29.40 ( a 20 second personal best). He has qualified for Nationals to be held in Perth on 7<sup>th</sup>-8<sup>th</sup> December. Jade also finished 4th in the State in the 13yr boys 800m, less than a second off another podium finish.

Hayley Kitching came 5th in the State in the 15yr girls 800m and 7th in the 400m making it in the top 8 in both events to race in the finals.

Olissa Onley is the NSW State Champion winning a gold medal in the 15 yrs girls 3000m event and placed 3rd in the 1500m race. Olissa has been selected to compete at Nationals in Perth in December

Alyssa Jenkins placed 7th in the 100 m final and 10th place overall in the State for long jump.

Georgia Kuchel jumped an incredible height of 1.60m placing her 3rd in the State in the 15yrs girls high jump.

Sophie Walsh placed 5th in her semi final in the 100m and 4th place in her 200m heat.
