## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I was very pleased to be able to share with students and with our P & C, that the joint funding application we made to the Department of Education, to build a double covered basketball court on our land in Camperdown Street has been successful. With projects of this type, the Department matches school funding up to the value of \$300,000.

Students will realise immediately that this is going to make a huge difference both to our delivery of PE and Sport programs and to improved recreational facilities. Many parents will have observed how currently about 50 students cram into the tiny area behind the post office during breaks to play basketball.

Currently we only have the hall as a covered PE area and for many weeks of the year, as for example during the next two weeks, it is unavailable due to exams. The new building will provide an all-weather, all year round facility. The research and successful proposal was put together by Deputy Principals, Kathy Steward and Connel Field. What an effective team!

Congratulations to Liam Snell, Year 11, who joined a select group of student leaders from across the state in the *Director for a Day* program and spent two days of Education Week at the Department of Education Head Office in Parramatta. Liam had the opportunity to put questions to the Secretary Mr Mark Scott. We are proud that Liam felt his probing questions around the teaching of environmental sustainability within the curriculum and facilities for country schools challenged Mr Scott, because surely quality education, which we strive to deliver, encourages young people to ask hard questions. Mr Scott's question back to Liam was to ask him which school he came from. Well done Liam – you put Coffs Harbour High on the educational radar!

## FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

#### **Attendance**

We actively promote attendance at school every day and encourage students to develop strong habits around punctuality and participation. A small number of students choose to regularly be late for class or truant class and we have been concerned about this.

We have advised in recent newsletters that we are trialling text messages to parents for individual lessons where their children have been marked absent in a school day. These are in addition to the morning text if a student has missed roll call. We have appreciated the support and understanding of parents as we are trying out this system and refining it to make it accurate. We had some early issues with the system not picking up some legitimate absences, for example, attending TAFE and sometimes there are errors with roll marking, however we believe we are getting closer to a more reliable system. Parents are always encouraged to call for more information or if they believe a mistake has been made.

We will be holding an assembly in week 6, Tuesday 27th August at 10.10am to celebrate and acknowledge our Aboriginal students, families and culture. Parents and friends are welcome. We would love to welcome our parents and families along to join their children for the morning sessions and morning tea.

#### Student achievement

We have many high performing students and strive to find opportunities for students to participate in enrichment activities to develop their talents and skills. During the last school holidays, Jace Driver from Year 10, participated in two such programs. ## LOCAL GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS EXCEL IN AUSTRALIAN GEOGRAPHY COMPETITION

Geography students from Coffs Harbour High School tested their geographical skills and knowledge against students from all around Australia in the 2019 Australian Geography Competition.

Geography teacher Ms Bonney said she had recently received the results and was pleased with how their students had performed. "We have a number of student geographers at our school who performed to a very high level in the competition this year with 2 gaining High Distinctions, 6 Distinctions and several Credits," said Ms Bonney. "Over 73,500 students from 792 schools across Australia entered the Australian Geography Competition so the results give us an external benchmark as to how our students are going in certain aspects of geography," she added.

Bernard Fitzpatrick, the Competition's national coordinator, said; "The Competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence."

"Geography is an important subject which develops a student's understanding of the spatial interrelationships between people and place. It helps students appreciate the complex nature of local, regional and global social, economic, and environmental interactions," said Mr Fitzpatrick.

High-achieving Year 11 students from the 2019 Australian Geography Competition will take part in a week training/selection event, Geography's Big Week Out being held on Kangaroo Island, South Australia in early December this year. From this event, four students will be chosen as members of the Team which will represent Australia at the 2020 International Geography Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey.

Funding to support the Geography's Big Week Out and the Australian Team to the International Geography Olympiad is provided by the Australian Department of Education and Training.

The Competition is a joint initiative of the Australian Geography Teachers' Association and the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland, and in NSW it is sponsored by Macquarie University.

#### HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS NUMERACY

Year 10 students have started to undertake their HSC Minimum Standards Numeracy test. So far 10MA1, 10MA2 and 10MA7 have participated and the majority have been successful in attaining the requirements of a level 3 or 4.



The Numeracy test is being done during their Mathematics lesson on Thursday afternoons during period 5 and 6 and they will be informed by their class teacher which Thursday.

The HSC minimum standard Numeracy test is a 45min online task. Students will only need to bring a pen as they will be provided with working paper and the calculator comes up on the screen for calculator approved questions.





## PARENT INFORMATION



Dear parents, guardians and carers

#### Re: Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive.

This information assists schools to:

- formally recognise the supports and adjustments provided to students with disability in schools
- consider how they can strengthen the support of students with disability in schools
- develop shared practices so that they can review their learning programs in order to improve educational outcomes for students with disability.

The NCCD provides state and federal governments with the information they need to plan more broadly for the support of students with disability.

The NCCD will have no direct impact on your child and your child will not be involved in any testing process. The school will provide data to the Australian Government in such a way that no individual student will be able to be identified – the privacy and confidentiality of all students is ensured. All information is protected by privacy laws that regulate the collection, storage and disclosure of personal information. # HSC MINIMUM STANDARD

#### **FACT SHEET**

You need reading, writing and maths skills to be successful in everyday life after school. That's why you're required to show a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.

To check you have the basics right, you need to sit short online tests of reading, writing and maths for everyday life.

You get two chances a year to pass each of the tests from Year 10 until a few years after the HSC. Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.

If you pass the online tests of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills you will show you've met the HSC minimum standard.



#### **HOW IS THE STANDARD SET?**

The standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and maths skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. It includes skills for tasks such as:

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Following safety instructions in equipment manuals

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Understanding a mobile phone plan

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
Writing a job application
