# FROM THE PRINCIPAL

It is with mixed emotions that I write to the school community for the last time. I have had the privilege and satisfaction of working in public education for the last 40 years and have never experienced a single day of regret at choosing the profession of high school teacher.

I have been fortunate to spend half my career in Sydney and half in regional NSW, with a couple of extended periods teaching in France on exchange. Teaching in both metropolitan and rural settings has given me greater insight into the importance of a quality, state-wide educational service for our children. My own children completed all their schooling in public schools. I firmly believe that our society is better served when young people from different family backgrounds, diverse values, religions, language and culture can come together in their local school to learn from each other and develop the interpersonal skills to co-exist harmoniously.

I am very proud to have had the opportunity to serve as Principal of Coffs Harbour High School since 2009 and in that time my driving goals have been fostering excellence and inclusivity.

Providing quality and diverse learning opportunities for students is at the heart of what our teachers do every day. Coffs Harbour High students graduate from our school well prepared for their futures. Young people from this last decade of Coffs Harbour High are scattered throughout our community and beyond in traineeships, apprenticeships, professional jobs and completing doctoral studies at university. They serve me as pharmacists, they fix my car, they patrol our beaches, they cook me meals in restaurants, they fill significant roles at the Base Hospital and some, to my immense joy, have become passionate teachers.

Career Education has blossomed under the guidance of our outstanding Careers Adviser, Ms Dionne Court who cares about the pathway for every single student and guides them with knowledge and passion. Students have opportunities for a range of career experiences before they leave school including work placement, school-based traineeships, TAFE tasters, university summer and winter schools and SES volunteer courses. We have students attending universities across the country and even one on scholarship in Canada. Popular destinations continue to be University of Newcastle and Griffith University along with our local Southern Cross University. We derive significant benefit as a school and community from being located in a university town.

# FROM THE PRINCIPAL

At Coffs Harbour High our doors are open to all children who live in our zone. Our Aboriginal student numbers have doubled this decade and our Aboriginal staff numbers have grown from one temporary staff member in 2009 to three permanent and two temporary in 2020. Four of our five Aboriginal staff are Gumbaynggirr people, strengthening our school's connection to country.

The moving school musical *Garlambirla*, the Aboriginal history of Coffs Harbour, developed from stories so generously shared with students and staff by Gumbaynggirr Elders will remain a highlight of my time at this school.

Coffs Harbour, as a regional destination for refugee intake, has shown how compassionate, welcoming and caring country towns can be and what a benefit to our community refugee resettlement can be. It has been wonderful to see numbers of students from refugee backgrounds expand in our school, helping us all in building deeper understanding of other cultures. EALD lead teacher Ms Deanne Ion has built a strong team of qualified teachers who assist our students to grow emotionally, socially and academically.

I am pleased that Coffs Harbour High established its first specialist support class four years ago and that we will open our second next year. Providing expert teaching for students with additional learning needs should be a priority of all schools.

In recent years we have had numerous excursions to Vietnam, Cambodia and China providing students with first-hand experience in countries of our Asian region. I have received an enormous amount of positive feedback from parents on how valuable these excursions have been in the social and intellectual development of their children. It was therefore with great regret that we witnessed the dismantling of the Confucius classroom initiative. The young volunteer teachers from China, who worked in our school, were intelligent and modest young people, valuable assistants in the classroom and did everything to fit in with the ethos and culture of our school and country. Our relationships with other countries are likely to be stronger and more productive if young people develop understanding of other people, languages and cultures.

Nurturing young people as they grow and develop from 12-year-old children into 18-year-old adults is what makes high school teaching such a rewarding (and at times challenging) career. I hope that all of our students leave Coffs Harbour High with memories of teachers who have made a positive difference in their lives and learning. Our incredible wealth of dedicated teachers, who care deeply about the students in their care, should make this goal eminently achieveable for every student.

Many, many people have assisted me and provided valuable support and advice during my time as Principal. However three remarkable women have been alongside for **all of my time here.** 

Kathy Steward was appointed as Deputy Principal in my first term at the school. She is an exceptional educator and a trusted colleague who embodies the values of public education. Her integrity, good judgement, deep knowledge and capacity for sustained hard work alongside a caring and compassionate approach to student and staff wellbeing have led to her being held in the highest regard by me and our school community.

Jann Clarke was office manager when I arrived and is the only remaining member of that original office team. Jann has built a highly skilled and cohesive team devolved across the school. She has an unwavering sense of what is right. In a large public organisation like ours, ethical leadership is vital and she has provided consistently wise, honest and policy-based counsel.

Karen Bryant has been a member of the P & C for the duration of my years at Coffs Harbour High, ten of these as P & C Treasurer. She even stayed as a member of P & C in 2020, after her youngest of three children had graduated, to assist with transition to a new team. Karen has written grants, been on numerous selection panels, kept P & C and canteen finances in order and has given honest and frank feedback on a range of operational and policy matters. Her sound reasoning, calm approach to every challenge and her articulate support of public education made P & C meetings a calendar event I looked forward to.

To Kath, Jann and Karen a very special personal thank you. The strength of public education is built on people of your calibre in our schools across the state.

To all students and their families my sincere best wishes for your remaining years at "Jetty" High, a place forever in my heart.







### Eco Surf Fest Artwork







### The results are finally in! The Australian Geography Competition

Just before all of the changes to school because of COVID, a group of students from Coffs Harbour High School joined over 65,800 students in 699 schools to participate in the Australian Geography Competition. It tested their geographical skills and knowledge and we are very pleased with how our students performed.

"We have a number of student geographers at our school who performed to a very high level in the competition this year with five high distinctions, four distinctions and four credits across the small group. In particular our year seven and eight students achieved well above the national average across knowledge, application and reasoning skills," said Mr Donald, the relieving head teacher responsible for Geography.

"It's been a challenging year with the pandemic, so we were happy to still be able to give our students the opportunity to test themselves against students all across the country," he added.

"Geography is such an important subject because it develops in students, a holistic understanding of the world around them, and their place in it. It is not just knowing about the environment – it is also about planning to manage it effectively – a sought after real world skill. Congratulations to all the participants!"

The competition runs in March-April each year and we plan to participate again in 2021.

### All Schools Athletics Championships


Fortunately Athletics NSW still held their annual All Schools Athletics Championships despite the life-changing pandemic and challenging restrictions we've battled with this year.

Hayley Kitching competed in three events including 1 preliminary & 3 finals over 4 days, culminating in 2 silver medals, 2 personal best times and a 4th place.

She raced to 2nd place in the 16yr 800m in her best time of 2:09.39. The following day she ran a nail-biting 1500m race, only finishing 2nd by 3 hundredths of a second in her best time of 4:30.67. With tired legs on the final day of competition she ran in the 400m and finished 4th in 59.80.

Schoolmate, Olissa Onley, also raced in the 16yr 1500m and placed 3rd in a personal best time of 4:34.57. The day before Olissa had won the silver medal in the 16yr 3000m race in 10:12.21. She competed in a very difficult double of distances.

## SCIENCE FACULTY

The Year 7E class were set the challenge of creating models of space craft. They conducted research on various space craft in preparation, and used this research either as inspiration, or to create a replica. Students collected and repurposed materials from home and combined them with school resources, and in the space of only one double period, they created absolutely fantastic models which currently are on display in F12.

### Year 10 Self Select Science - PULSE@Parkes

Year 10 Self Select Science students participated in a remote access session with the radiotelescope at Parkes. They had actual telescope time, and during that session they collected data on a number of different pulsars within our galaxy (specifically J1003-4747, J1820-0427, J1830-1059). They then used the data they collected to calculate where in our galaxy each pulsar was located, which was visually displayed, and the students got within 2% of the actual position which was very close. They also asked insightful questions of the various presenters on the day.


Pulsars are spherical, compact objects that are about the size of a large city but contain more mass than the sun. **Radio pulsars** are generally accepted to be highly-magnetised, rapidly rotating neutron stars with a light-house beam of radiation that produces the pulsed emission.

Pulsar astronomers have now detected over 1500 pulsars and expect to discover thousands more during the next few years. More than two-thirds of the currently known pulsars were discovered using the Parkes radio telescope (the star of the film "The Dish").

So what did the students learn? The observations of pulsars told them that:

- they are far away
- they are very small
- they are very dense
- they can orbit other objects
- they were probably born in supernova explosions
- they are travelling very fast through space
- the time between pulses is extremely regular although they are slowing down very slightly.

Astronomers using the Parkes radio telescope have discovered a pulsar in orbit with another pulsar. This has caused great excitement in the astronomical community because these pulsars allow theories of gravity to be tested with phenomenal accuracy. We already know that millisecond pulsars in binary systems are superb probes for studying Einstein's general theory of relativity. The orbits of such pulsar systems have been studied for many years to see if the observations agree with prediction. Einstein's theory agrees perfectly with the observations. The new double pulsar system will allow even better tests to be made.

The class was treated to a dolphin presentation followed by a VIP tour of the facilities at Dolphin Marine Magic. Students observed injured turtles recovering, as well as a group that are now ready to be re-released. Favourites included the sea lions, and the little penguins.

SafeWork NSW recognises that some secondary documents are provided digitally and therefore will accept original digital documentation to attend training. The digital document must be an original from the source/issuer and must display the applicant's full name. This may include banking apps on smartphones, emailed utility bills direct from the company etc. but would not include an emailed photograph of the document or similar copies or extracts.

### **Special Arrangements**

Special arrangements apply only for participants in groups such as Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders, School sector or Overseas persons recently arrived in Australia (for less than six weeks)

In addition, special exception to the EOI requirements may apply to 'persons at risk'. Such exceptions will be dealt with on a case-by-case basis via Training, Accreditation and Compliance Services on 1800 855 969.

All EOI documentation provided under special arrangements must be original.

### Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders (points system does not apply)

Provide two written statements on organisational/company letterhead verifying the person's identification. Statements must be written by an Authorised Referee.

Authorised referees for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders include:

- Chairperson, secretary or CEO of an incorporated Indigenous organisation (including land councils, community councils, housing organisations etc).
- Community development employment projects coordinator.
- School principal.
- School counsellor.
- · Minister of religion.
- · Treating health professional or manager in Aboriginal medical services.
- · Centrelink staff, Centrelink agent or other government employee of at least five years.

### Secondary school sector (points system does not apply)

Option 1: The identity of the student has been verified by sighting any one of the original documents listed below:

- Australian Birth Certificate/card (minimum 14 years) issued by the Registrar of Births Deaths and Marriages
- Australian Citizenship Certificate
- Current Australian driver's licence or learner driver's licence
- International travel documents including a current passport or a passport which has expired within the
  last two years but has not been cancelled.

### Option 2:

The identity of the student has been verified by sighting a written statement on school letterhead confirming the student's name and date of birth.

### Option 3:

The identity of the student has been verified by sighting a student ID card that contains the school crest/seal, photo, student's name and date of birth.

### Overseas persons recently arrived in Australia less than six weeks (points system does not apply)

- Current Passport OR
- Other international documents of identity that have the same characteristics as a passport e.g. diplomatic documents and documents issued to refugees.

### AND one of the following:

- Current drivers licence (Australian or overseas).
- · Credit/Savings account card (Australian or overseas).
