Still, I wanted to take this opportunity before the start of the HSC exams to wish all of our Year 12 students the very best for their final exams. I want to encourage students to keep working at it, using this additional time to do further study and preparation so they can give it their best shot and finish with their best possible result. The end is in sight; it is the last stretch after a long year, not long to go now, and Year 12 can then sit back and reflect on their previous 13 years of schooling and their future aspirations and life directions.

FROM THE PRINCIPAI

Thank you, Jann Clarke

You may have seen mention on our school Facebook page of the retirement of our School Administration Manager - Jann Clarke. Jann has worked for the NSW Department of Education for over 30 years, with the last 16 years as the School Administration Manager at Coffs Harbour High School. While I am new to Coffs High, I have known Jann and how well regarded she is well before starting here as Principal. Jann has been responsible for building and leading one of the most outstanding school administrative staff teams I have worked with. Jann is a very modest person and understates her impact on our school - she will be missed by us all. We wish her all the best in her



retirement and hope she gets the opportunity to spend quality time with family and doing the many outdoor recreational activities she enjoys.

Update on COVID restrictions

I have been doing my best to keep all parents, students and staff updated on relevant changes to COVID restrictions impacting schools. There have been some recent changes that have brought some changes forward and which I will take this opportunity to explain.

The wearing of face masks is still mandatory for all indoor areas and on buses. However, both staff and students are no longer required to wear masks outdoors. All schools have been audited regarding ventilation, and works are underway to ensure that any repairs to windows occur so that we have adequate ventilation in all areas. We have also recently had a quite sophisticated air conditioning system installed in nearly all classrooms as part of the state-wide Cooler Classrooms program. This system has sensors that automatically regulate airflow and introduce fresh air to classrooms.

From the 8th of November, all school staff and any other adult workers on the school site will be required to be double-vaccinated. There is no current requirement for students to be vaccinated, but this has been strongly encouraged by the government and health experts.

There may be some relaxation of other restrictions towards the end of this term, such as those affecting school assemblies, visitors and end of year functions. We have set some tentative dates for some important end of year celebrations and will provide further information and organisation when/if restrictions ease.

Introduction of Yondr mobile phone pouches

Given the disruption to schools due to COVID, we have not been able to implement changes to student mobile phone policy and introduce the Yondr phone pouches as we had initially intended. Both the parent and staff surveys on this issue have shown majority support for these changes. Still, we feel it is best to implement them once things have settled for students and there is less threat of disruption due to COVID, so we have delayed this implementation until the start of 2022.

NAPLAN results and literacy/numeracy assessment

The school has received envelopes containing Year 7 and 9 individual student NAPLAN results. Unfortunately, these results are supplied by the government without any addressing or means of postage. So I wanted to make parents and carers aware that we will hand them individually to Year 7 and 9 students on Thursday 28th November.

The NSW Department of Education also requires all NSW secondary schools to participate in an additional literacy and numeracy "check-in" assessment for Years 7, 8 and 9. These assessments will provide additional data to assist school planning and classroom teachers to improve student literacy and numeracy. We will also be participating in a further "readiness test" at the end of the year to prepare the school to implement an online NAPLAN assessment in 2022. This assessment is purely a trial run to assist in determining whether school IT systems and processes will be able to handle the actual online NAPLAN assessment next year. Literacy and numeracy attainment is an essential part of all NSW public school plans, and we have specific targets that we need to achieve over the next few years. We are implementing several strategies to assist students in developing these skills. It was heartening to see the state government recently announced the extension of additional tutoring for students in literacy and numeracy into 2022.

Attendance – Every day counts

Did you know that poor student attendance impacts academic, socio-economic and health outcomes for students? Research has shown that it can lead to poorer long-term mental health and social outcomes, an increased likelihood of involvement with criminal activity and an increased chance of the student requiring social assistance as an adult. Students with less than 90% attendance rates may be educationally at risk. So a key target in our school planning (and for planning across all NSW government schools) is to increase the proportion of students with greater than 90% attendance. By improving attendance, we are also likely to improve student literacy, numeracy and other academic results, and so this should be an important priority for our staff, students and parents. Much of our school attendance strategy will be implemented starting 2022 but we have gotten the ball rolling by focusing on reducing student lateness and truancy. We are also conducting two surveys to help determine the attitudes and knowledge of students and parents regarding attendance. Students have already completed a survey during our sports afternoon, and we will shortly be sending out a survey to parents. These surveys will help us to target initiatives focussing on improving attendance.

Check-in assessment for Years 7, 8 and 9

Coffs Harbour High School will be undertaking the Check-in assessments for mainstream students in Year 7 to 9. The students will participate in a reading and numeracy Check-in assessment.

The Check-in assessment is a NSW Department of Education online reading and numeracy assessment available to support schools to assess and monitor student learning.

The assessments can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

The assessment will be scheduled:

Year 7 students on Thursday October 28th during periods 3 and 4.

Year 8 students on Monday November 1st period 3 and Wednesday November 3rd period 2.

Year 9 students on Wednesday November 3rd during periods 3 and 4.

Students with disability may receive the same level of support during the assessment that they would normally receive in the classroom.

Free Guy

Directed by: Shawn Levy

With very few movies being released recently, most of which consist of mediocre to low quality, Free Guy is a refreshing experience to get people to start enjoying movies again but that isn't to say it itself is of a largely better quality.

Free Guy, directed by Shawn Levy (the person who also directed movies such as Real Steel, The Internship and the Night At The Museum franchise), follows the story of an npc, also known as a non-player character, in a video game called Free City who realizes that he is nothing but a background for players so he decides that he's going to be the good guy. Now whilst this sounds like a fantastic idea, if a viewer really thinks about it, how many times have we as an audience seen the story of an AI or robot gaining intelligence that it shouldn't be able to? We even had this plot back in the late 1980's with movies like Short Circuit. Travel costs and accommodation will be covered for Regional Youth Taskforce members travelling across NSW for meetings.

The Taskforce is an initiative by the Deputy Premier and Office for Regional Youth, headed by the State's first-ever Minister for Regional Youth, the Hon. Bronnie Taylor. The Office for Regional Youth is responsible for delivering a broad range of strategic programs to address regional youth issues and ensure young people have every opportunity to live, work and thrive in regional NSW.

If you believe your child would be a great fit and could make a difference to your community, you should encourage them to apply. Being part of the 2022 Regional Youth Taskforce connects young people and will engage your child on issues such as entering the workforce, mental health and public transport in the regions. The Taskforce will provide them with the ability to influence important decisions the Government makes on these topics and many more.

Applications are open now and close at midnight Sunday 21 November 2021 and young people aged 12-24 from regional areas are eligible to apply. The third Taskforce will be appointed from January 2022 until 31 December 2022.

School Travel for 2022



2022 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2022 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for a school travel pass for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of anew shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, or who have repeated a yearor received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications and current entitlements are updated and remain valid. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new <u>eligibility criteria</u>, they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2022.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

School Student Transport Scheme site change

On 1 October 2021 the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) information and application portal was moved to **transportnsw.info**. This will assist families to find all their travel information in the one place.

Travel from Term 1 2022

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) open at the start of Term4 2021 for travel in 2022, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a difficult period for local bus operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations increasingly difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel on a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local bus operator</u> to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Please also remember that students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the <u>Student code of conduct</u> and <u>Opal terms of use</u>.
