STEP 3

Click on 'Order Photos' and complete your details and procedures. During this process you can place orders for additional children at your school and sibling photos, if available







cash/envelope ordering

Your school prefers orders to be placed online. However, if you are unable to order online, please complete your order using the order envelope provided.

STEP 1

Complete a separate order envelope for each individual child's package/s ordered. If ordering for more than one child, payment should be enclosed in the envelope of the eldest child and this should be indicated on the envelope of the other child/children (the envelope that does not have cash enclosed).

STEP 2

Enclose exact cash payment in one envelope for the package/s you are ordering. Payment for more than one child should be in the eldest child's envelope and marked at the bottom of the envelope in the space provided.

STEP 3

Return your completed envelope/s, with correct cash payment, to our photographers on the day.

Please note: You must enclose exact correct payment, as change is not available. Credit card payments can only be made online and we no longer accept cheques. There is a separate envelope for sibling photo orders, should your school choose to offer sibling photos.

School photographs will be returned approximately 6 weeks after the day of photography. Please note this delivery timeframe is dependant on proofing and additional photography days at your school.

IMPORTANT - "not for publication" students

If you have instructed your school that your child's image is "not for publication" (sometimes called "do not publish" or "not for media release" instructions), the school will ensure that your child is not presented to our photographers on photo day and school photographs will not be available for purchase. If you wish to change your instruction, then you must notify your school, so they change their records and identify your child as able to be photographed for school photography purposes. All students presented to our photographers by your school on photo day will be photographed, their images will appear in school photography packages with their fellow students and these packages will be available to purchase by all families.























YEAR 8 GROUP CHALLENGE

On Tuesday 29th of November, over 150 Year 6 students from local primary schools attended their Orientation Day at Coffs Harbour High School.


They were supported by 39 Year 9 Peer Support Leaders who ran activities, school tours and attended taster lessons with the Primary School students.

PROGRAMME FOR INTERNATIONAL STUDENT ASSESSMENT (PISA)

PISA Comes to Coffs Harbour High School.

On Tuesday 23rd August 2022, 15 students from our school represented not just Coffs Harbour High School but Australia in the Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA).

PISA 2022 will involve more than half-a-million students (representing about 29 million 15-year-old students) from around 85 countries. PISA assesses students' skills and knowledge in reading, mathematics, science and financial literacy, providing both a national and international perspective. The results of PISA provide information towards monitoring how well young Australians are meeting important educational goals, assists in identifying areas of strengths and weaknesses in the Australian education system and allows the comparison of student performance with other countries.

A huge thank you to the following students from Year 9 and 10 who participated in the programme which entailed over three hours of online testing. All of the following students will receive a certificate at their year assembly in Week 10.






The trip was long with only a stop at Taree for food and a quick stop for petrol.

After many long hours on the bus, students were full of life and eager to explore the streets of central Sydney, we all checked into the Surry Hills Village Hostel before spending time at the Prince Alfred Park across the street. Two Year 9 girls selected for exclusive STEM program.

Lani Cooper and Defne Merdanoglu are two of only 120 girls selected, Australia-wide, for Curious Minds, a STEM program for female students in years 9 and 10 from regional and rural areas across Australia.

For six months, they will participate in extension STEM workshops and activities to increase their confidence in science, technology, engineering and maths.

The students will attend summer and winter camps where they'll get a chance to learn about STEM through hands-on experiments and workshops, explore University campuses and meet new friends. The online summer camp kicks off from 4 December for student in Australia's west, while east-coast residents will meet virtually from 11 December. Students will come together to meet face-to-face in July 2023.



Curious Minds gives participants access to STEM role models by matching students with working in STEM fields. partnership, they explore STEM subjects, university courses and career pathways while creating personal goals and discussing STEM interests. This year's mentors include a diverse mix of engineers, physicists, mathematicians, research and medical scientists, medical practitioners, chemists, geologists, and environmental scientists.

"Only 21% of girls want to pursue a STEM career compared to 42% of boys. Curious Minds aims to show girls the vast diversity of STEM careers, and how women are making a difference in their chosen fields."

"This program switches girls on to all aspects of STEM, exposes them to outstanding role

models, and brings girls together in an extension learning environment where they get to know other young women like themselves who are passionate about STEM," said program director Dr Kelsie Dadd.

Both Lani and Defne have demonstrated an outstanding level of talent, interest, and achievement in Mathematics this year and are eagerly looking forward to their futures in a STEM related field. We wish them every success and hope that they find their participation to be a rewarding and enriching experience.
