FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome to all our new students and staff and welcome back to those who are returning this year. Term 1 is always a busy term, but this year it has been even busier. We have already had our school photos, swimming carnival, Year 7 Meet the Teacher evening and our Year 7 students are off to their Wellbeing camp this week at Darlington Park. We have a few other major events this term including the Year 10 Road Trauma and Safety presentation this Wednesday, NAPLAN exams for Years 7 and 9 starting next Thursday, and the Year 8 Great Aussie Bush Camp in Week 9. We have also made a number of changes this year including the addition of a roll call each morning and a new House Points system, where positive student actions and achievement contribute to an Inter-House competition.

Being the first newsletter for the year, I thought I would take the opportunity to explain some aspects of school operation that have become relevant more recently.

School Uniform

Coffs Harbour High School has an established school uniform. There are several benefits to having a school uniform. The decision to require students to wear school uniform is one that was made, as it is in all public schools, in consultation with parents, staff and students.

We have a very flexible and accessible uniform that includes a unisex sports uniform, practical footwear requirements and multiple options for students. We also offer assistance to families who are experiencing financial difficulties and are unable to afford uniform. We are very lucky to have a P&C-run uniform shop, that opens prior to school recommencing each year, to make school uniform even more accessible to students and parents.

As principal, I am expected to support this policy and ensure that students wear school uniform.

There is an expectation from the school community that there is some consequence for students who choose not to follow this requirement. Accordingly, it has been the practice for several years that teachers check school uniform and that students who are not in uniform are asked to provide a note from a parent to ensure that the parent is aware. As part of our expectations around uniform, students who do not wear school uniform without a note explaining good reason are warned and eventually prevented from participating in non-curriculum and non-mandatory school activities for the following school term. These activities include things such as representative sport, school socials, and non-mandatory school excursions. We allow for the fact that there are days when a student may be out of uniform and is unable to supply a parent note by allowing students 5 days each term where they can be out of uniform without explanation.

Now that we have a separate roll call, we are able to more consistently check for uniform on a daily basis (senior students have uniform checked Period 1 each day). Unfortunately, a small number of students choose not to wear school uniform on a regular basis, and this has led to these students being issued with letters warning them that they risk being prevented from participating in non-mandatory extracurricular activities. I must stress at this point that I have spoken to students on multiple occasions on assembly regarding these requirements and students are reminded regularly in roll call when they are asked why they are out of uniform. The letters that are sent home are only to inform parents that their child is out of uniform, as their child will already be well aware of the issue. Obviously, a student who continuously chooses not to wear school uniform will very quickly accrue these warning letters and combined with delays in post, it is quite possible for parents to receive the letters together or even out of order. However, I must stress again that these students will be well aware of the issue by the time letters arrive home and will have been provided with opportunities to supply notes and gain support with getting into uniform.

In all cases, when a student is prevented from attending no-compulsory school activities, they can apply to the principal in writing to explain any particular circumstances and request permission to attend these activities. In cases where a student can demonstrate that they have made a committed effort to follow our school uniform requirements they will be permitted to attend these activities.

Timetable changes and class cover for absent teachers

I wrote to all parents last week to explain that, as part of the normal staffing procedures that all NSW public schools operate under, the school was required to reduce our staffing this year and that this would require a change in student timetables. In that letter/email I provided a brief explanation of the reasons for this reduction. The changes that were made have included reducing the number of classes in Year 9 to reflect the reduced number of students in that year and reducing the number of face-to-face teaching periods for smaller senior classes. I have had concerns raised by some parents and students regarding these decisions and I thought I would explain a little further here to reassure parents and students. School staffing is extremely complex in a school of the size of Coffs Harbour High School. Managing classes and

staffing requires that I adhere to industrial awards and agreements, NSW Department of Education policy around things such as class sizes, curriculum policy, etc, and do so while staying within budget. There are a number of constraints that impact decisionmaking, but our overall goal is always to maximise the curriculum delivery opportunities and quality within these constraints. The circumstances we have found ourselves in this year are no different to those I have experienced previously at other schools or are currently being experienced by other schools. The solutions we have been required to develop to overcome some of the challenges associated with managing these requirements are equally common among schools. In the case of reducing face-to-face teaching periods for students, the only alternative to reducing teaching periods would have been to cease to offer subjects with smaller class sizes and then force students, who have been studying these subjects for some weeks now, to reselect from remaining subjects. By instead retaining these subjects with smaller classes, we have allowed students to continue with the subjects they selected last year but doing so requires that we reduce the face-to-face teaching periods to balance our overall reduced school staffing. In doing this we are acknowledging that teaching very small numbers of students allows teachers to get through content at a faster rate than larger classes.

Coupled with these changes are ongoing concerns regarding uncovered classes or classes under minimal supervision. These issues are unrelated to the need to reduce teaching periods, but they obviously cause concern regarding their impact on student learning. Unfortunately, the need to have classes uncovered is a consequence of the fact that we do not have enough casual teachers available to cover all staff absences. However, I wanted parents and students to be assured that we are doing all we can to minimise the impact through measures such as:

- Purchasing additional resources and texts to make available directly to students to support their independent study and learning.
- Not requiring senior students to attend roll call each morning and instead making available a teacher from each faculty so that students can seek assistance with their work during this time.
- Ensuring teachers utilise existing resources such as MS Teams and Google Classroom to help set work and better communicate with students.
- Where teachers are aware of an upcoming absence, providing work for students to complete independently.
- Providing all students with access to a copy of syllabus dot points, scope and sequence or other appropriate curriculum documents to help track their progress through course outcomes AND have students engage with this document to mark off work as they complete it to reassure them that they are meeting outcomes and remaining on track.
- Providing additional space in the library for seniors to complete schoolwork.
 This will include the Lighthouse Learning Hub area, which is currently under-utilised.

FROM THE PRINCIPAL

I appreciate the support of students and parents under these circumstances, and I am confident that, through these strategies and the hard work of teachers, we will be able to ensure that students remain on track with their work and able to achieve results commensurate with their ability and efforts.

- Request a refund if required







Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- · Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

· Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

· Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.



The website shows our new resources, book of the week, recently returned items, and has tips on how to correctly reference assignments. House Points are awarded to consistent student borrowers and anyone who leaves a rating or review on a book they have borrowed.

As part of the Teacher Librarian role, Ms Montgomery is available to work with senior students and provide assistance with their school work, including assessment tasks, for all writing-based subjects including English, History, Society and Culture and more. Assistance can also be provided to senior students in devising study timetables, creating effective study routines and advice on managing workloads. Invent or innovate something that will change our world and leave a lasting impact.


Teams of 5 students will work together on a range of design thinking challenges and on finding a solution to their problems.

Rock got no reason, rock got not rhyme! You better get me to school on time!


Coffs Harbour High School has two students who have been cast in the local production of School of Rock, Shanaya Pitt (year 10) and Hugo Weiley (year 8).
