FROM THE PRINCIPAL

My report will be a brief one for this newsletter. It has been a long and busy term for students and staff and it is clear that everyone is ready for a break. This term saw Year 7 and 8 attend their year camps, and Years 7 and 9 complete NAPLAN exams. We had our swimming carnival and our Harmony Day, which were both highly successful. We have finished the term with a CAPA performance afternoon, our SRC school social and the recent parent-teacher evening. Our Year 10 Science and Engineering Challenge students managed a very respectable 2nd place this week and our Years 9 and 10 Self Select Science students are currently off at their yearly excursion in Sydney. I wanted to take this opportunity to thank all of our students, and particularly all of our staff, for their efforts throughout the term. It has been a settled start to the year, and I am hoping that we will have an equally productive Term 2.

Moving into Term 2, I wanted to make parents aware that we will be conducting a review of our Year 7 and 8 E-Class initiative. Mr MacDonald has agreed to take on the role of Coordinator for the E-Class and will be working with a team of teachers during Term 2 to interview and survey staff, students and parents, including some of our partner Primary School students and parents. We want to get a better understanding of what everyone's expectations are for this class so that we can ensure that the way we select students, the way teachers teach the class, the extra opportunities the class provides for students, and the expectations we place on students within the class, align with the expectations of our school community. Term 1 is almost over and traditionally sets the tone for the year ahead. At the very top of activities which impact on school performance, engagement and achievement is attendance. The DOE has a target for every student to attend school more than 90% of the time.

In a Term of 50 days that is just over 40 days attendance to hit this milestone and ensure;

- Greater achievement (up to 80% higher than those with low attendance)
- Increased engagement (students with more than 90% attendance showed almost triple the levels of engagement over those with less than 90%)
- Significantly improved cognition (students with attendance above 90% miss significantly fewer lessons and are more able to link more outcomes and ensure they remain on track to achieve greater awareness and competencies)

Term 1 for Coffs Harbour High saw us achieve many significant attendance results including;

- The school delivered over 46,000 days of teaching amounting to almost 230 000 hours of content for just Term 1
- Almost 400 students achieving greater than 90% attendance for the Term
- Almost 200 students achieving 95 - 100% attendance for the Term
- Year 7 achieved the highest attendance rates for the Term closely followed by Year 9, 8, 12, 11 and then Year 10.
- Boys with slightly better attendance than girls (by just 2%)
- The best attending group in the school is currently Year 7 boys. The group with the biggest challenge to achieve their attendance goals and the most room for improvement are Year 10 boys.

Remember 90% is a pass target, anything less is robbing students of the ability to learn and perform at higher levels across the entire school.



The SRC and Prefect body have had a big Term 1.

HARMONY DAY

We celebrated Harmony Day with a Fundraiser for The Birthing Kit Foundation (Australia). This group is a humanitarian organisation that provides birthing kits and education in clean birthing practices to women birthing at home in remote regions of the developing world.

In Australia we are very fortunate that our mothers have opportunities to have their babies in a hygienic way, free from infection. Other mothers around the world are not as fortunate.

Our fundraising efforts will allow us to purchase and pack these birthing kits that will then be distributed around the world where needed. We aim to raise at least \$1000 over the next few terms. This will allow us to purchase 200 kits. The BBQ raised \$255.75. A great start. Thank you CHHS.

We also ended our celebration of Harmony week with a Harmony Day Assembly showcasing some of our diverse cultures at Coffs Harbour High School.



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HARMONY DAY

Harmony Week is a time to celebrate Australian multiculturalism, and the successful integration of migrants into our community. Australia is one of the most successful multicultural countries in the world and we should celebrate this and work to maintain it.

YEAR 9 - 200Hr MULTIMEDIA

Over the past weeks, Year 9 Multimedia (200Hr) has explored the intricacies of digital design; creating raster and vector graphics using platforms such as Photoshop, Illustrator, and CANVA. They've also examined the impact of AI-generated art on society, fostering their design skills and understanding of technology's broader implications.

Now, equipped with a foundation for graphic design, these students are ready to tackle their next challenge: designing and crafting their own board games. This endeavour will integrate illustration, 3D modelling, and printing as they conceptualise and develop unique gaming experiences. With access to 3D printing and laser-cutting technology to refine their designs, the term ahead promises a blend of innovation, creativity, and hands-on learning.

YEARS 9 AND 10 INTEREST ELECTIVE

This term, our students have been immersing themselves in the world of digital design, focusing particularly on apparel design techniques. They've been hard at work mastering skills such as creating vector images, utilising vinyl cutting, and applying Heat Press Vinyl to bring their designs to life on T-shirts and hats.

Through practical applications and hands-on experiences, they'll delve into small business opportunities and discover how their creative talents can translate into entrepreneurial ventures. GEOGRAPHY FIELD WORK

Geography makes more sense when you can see it happening around you! Our year ten students have completed their Stage 5 mandatory field work to better understand coastal management and its issues. While all students looked at how creeks, beaches and human uses interact (and whether it is sustainable), this year it meant either travelling to Urunga and Dalhousie Creek at Hungry Head or taking an in depth look at Coffs Creek instead.



COFFS CREEK EXCURSION

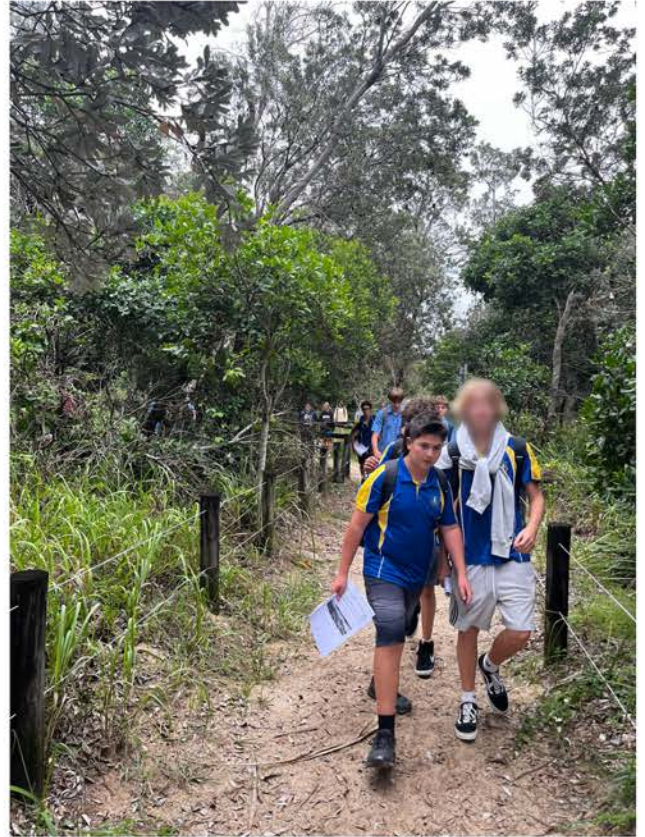
While the decision to stay at school or go into the field was difficult because of the predicted weather, the Skills for Work group and Mr Donald's class headed down to Bulungaal (Coffs Creek). The goal was to gather first hand information about the health of the environment and how it is affected by three important geographical processes – erosion, transportation and deposition.



Students completed field sketches that were compared with photographs gathered over the past fifty years to identify what has changed and what is the same. With staff assistance, observations and measurements were also completed on the vegetation around the creek mouth, the effectiveness of erosion protection measures and the health of the mangroves. Both groups concluded there is more to do to make sure the creek is a safe, healthy and sustainable environment for all of us – and that hot chips helps us to put up with a little bit of rain.

URUNGA AND DALHOUSIE CREEK

This field work has been done over the last few years by successive year ten classes and is always an insightful experience. Walking the boardwalk allows students to see the estuary, salt marsh and beach environments with fresh eyes and helps to understand how they all interact to create a stunning location. Travelling down to Hungry Head clearly shows how natural processes are constantly reshaping the beach as the creek reaches the ocean. This year the area showed how successful attempts to protect the surf lifesaving watch tower have been. Students demonstrated a genuine understanding of coastal processes and how complex they can be – all before a sausage sandwich and a safe trip home.



Thank you to all the HSIE teachers and support staff involved in making our field work successful for another year.
