



COFFS HARBOUR PUBLIC SCHOOL ROCK GIG



BOOK WEEK

We had a wonderful time celebrating Book Week recently and sharing the joy of reading with the school community. We particularly enjoyed our Book Character Dress-Up Day, with lots of staff and students getting involved and dressing up as the book character of their choice. Thank you to everyone who made the effort!

THE BENEFITS OF READING - What does the research say?

- Children who are given time for independent reading at school are more likely to enjoy reading books for fun.
- Reading is four times more influential on intellectual progress in teens than having a parent with a university degree.
- Across the general population, a 20% reduction in mortality was observed for those who read books (30 mins a day), compared to those who did not read books.
- Adults who read books, magazines, and newspapers almost every day had a substantially lower risk of being diagnosed with depression. They also scored lower on the loneliness scale.
- Reading for just 30 minutes a week means you're 57% more likely to have a greater awareness of other cultures.











WRITE A BOOK IN A DAY



YEAR 11 HERON ISLAND EXCURSION

There are school trips... and then there are Heron Island trips. This September, our Year 11 students were lucky enough to experience five unforgettable days on one of Australia's most spectacular reef islands, blessed with near-perfect weather and some of the clearest snorkeling conditions imaginable.

The adventure began on Sunday evening, when we boarded the coach bound for Gladstone Marina. After a long overnight drive with varying degrees of "bus-sleep," students stretched their legs on the marina playground and grassy flats before boarding the Nancy Wake ferry (the regular CAT was out of service). The crossing delivered its fair share of confused seas, a few queasy stomachs, and a new appreciation for the "three points of contact" rule. Spirits remained high as Heron Island came into view under blue skies and protected waters.

From then on, the island delivered day after day of magic. Our mornings began with the option of fitness on the sand followed by snorkels in the harbour, where students swam out to the wreck, often finding turtles, fish, and reef sharks resting in the shadows. One afternoon snorkel produced an unforgettable scene with nine sharks circling together in what will forever be remembered (and retold many times over) as the great "Sharknado."



The boat snorkels were even more spectacular. At Wistari, the current drift carried us across coral gardens alive with parrotfish, angelfish, and clouds of tiny damsels. At Hero Bommie, students floated above towering coral outcrops, spotting turtles and rays weaving between the bommies. Viv's provided dazzling reef walls where white-tip reef sharks and eagle rays cruised in the blue. One lucky group even had a manta ray spiral past them, a truly breathtaking moment.

At Canyons, we drifted over deep trenches and shallower coral ridges teeming with marine life. The snorkels were like swimming through a living documentary. Schools of trevally flashed past, blue-spotted rays were half-buried in the sand, green turtles glided alongside us, and the occasional loggerhead surfaced for air. Every snorkel was different, every drift revealed something new, and the crystal-clear visibility made it easy to take it all in.

One of the boat trips back held an extra surprise. Our boatie, Fabio, suddenly spotted a whale tail in the distance. With a grin, he opened up the throttle and zipped us across the water to investigate. What followed was nothing short of magical: a mother humpback patiently guiding her calf as it practised tail slaps. The calf's smaller, clumsy attempts reminded us that even in nature, learning takes time, patience and practice. It was a rare glimpse of the reef's wild classroom in action.









Afternoons offered the perfect balance of science and leisure. After collecting plankton samples on the boat, students examined them under microscopes and were amazed at the tiny, alien-like creatures that fuel the entire reef ecosystem. We also had coral and turtle lectures that deepened our appreciation of everything we were experiencing. Down at Shark Bay and North Beach, students had free time where they kicked a footy on the sand, swam in the shallows, or simply lay back to watch rays glide along what quickly became known as the "ray expressway."

Just when we thought the adventure was over, we found ourselves stranded for an extra day when the return ferry was declared out of action. Disappointment quickly turned into delight at bonus snorkels, including another epic drift from Pam's Point, across Hero Bommie, past Viv's and all the way to the Coral Garden.


Our rescue came courtesy of a passing barge, which collected us at 10pm Saturday night and delivered us safely back to Gladstone at 4am, chugging along at a steady 12 knots for those wondering. From there it was straight onto the coach and the long road home.

This trip gave our students more than just stunning snorkels and sunshine. It offered moments of connection and wonder that will stay with them for life. We are so proud of the way they embraced every challenge, bonded as a group, and represented our school in such a positive way.

Heron Island reminded us all of the beauty and fragility of our reef, and just how lucky we are to experience

it so closely.
