### FROM THE PRINCIPAL

This will be my last newsletter for 2022 as I will be taking two weeks of long service leave at the end of this term. Mrs Angela Kellahan will be relieving principal in my absence up until the end of this year. As you can see from the number of stories and reports in this edition of the newsletter, there has been a lot going on already this term and there is a lot to update parents and carers regarding.

#### **Year 12**

A big congratulations to all our Year 12 students who have now completed their HSC exams. This year 67,327 NSW students completed the HSC. HSC results will be delivered via SMS and email on Thursday 15 December. I want to wish our HSC Class of 2022 all the best with their results and whatever they choose to do in the future.

#### **COVID-19 update**

The number of reported COVID infections amongst students and staff has significantly decreased this term for several reasons to the point of none or only one a week, with the exception of this last week where we have had three students report that they have contracted COVID. You would be aware that requirements around isolation and other restrictions have changed recently. With such a trickle of cases I have not been sending out emails informing parents, but I will resume these emails if we start to get more significant increases in reported cases. Schools are still being supported with additional COVID cleaning and we still have access to hand sanitiser, face masks and Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) should students or staff require them.

#### **Basketball courts and student supervision before and after school**

I need to ensure parents/carers, students and community members are aware of restrictions related to our new covered basketball courts. This is a fantastic facility for students to be able to access during school hours.

However, it has been built on NSW Department of Education school land and so when I am asked if the public are able to access these facilities outside of school hours, unfortunately I have to say that technically they cannot. As the site is not fully fenced, I am aware that the courts have been getting extensive use outside of hours and that this would be seen as a very positive thing, but they are located on NSW Department of Education land and signage is in place to make this clear to the public. This means that any members of the public are not covered if they enter onto the site without permission and are injured.

In line with this, it is also timely that I remind all students, parents and carers that the school only provides supervision to students half an hour before school (starting 8:40 am) and a half hour after school until 3:40 pm. This means that if students are sent to school outside of this time, then they will not be supervised. Ideally, we would prefer that students only enter onto the school site at times where there is supervision provided.

### **Re-introduction of morning roll call**

After our school audit earlier in Term 3, the auditor expressed concern that we do not have a morning roll call. Like the vast majority of schools, Coffs Harbour High School previously had a morning roll call, but this was removed a few years ago. In line with the auditors' recommendations, we will be restoring a 25-minute roll call at the start of every day, from the start of the 2023 school year. This will not impact on the start and end time for the school day (9:10 am to 3:10 pm) and recess and lunch will remain at 30 minutes each. Each period will be shortened slightly to make time for this roll call, with adjustments to period bell times. Roll call will effectively replace Home Rooms on a Wednesday and students will simply go to lunch after period 3 and then off to sport. Years 7 - 10 students will be placed in roll call classes by year groups, clustered in geographically close classrooms so that Year Advisers and Head Teachers can easily access students to provide support. The purpose of roll call will be to mark the daily roll, read daily notices and announcements to students, and check school uniform. One day per week will be set aside for a year meeting in this time (9:10 am – 9:35 am). The remainder of roll call time will be spent on a combination of wellbeing, literacy and numeracy activities. Teachers will also talk with students regarding their attendance and general progress. Year 11 and 12 students will not be required to attend roll call and will instead sign in normally or be marked in attendance in their Period 1 lesson. During roll call, a timetable of tutorials will be offered for seniors, and staffed for different subject areas. Attendance at these tutorial sessions will be optional but all seniors will need to be signed in prior to or at commencement of Period 1. Year Advisers will also utilise this time for a weekly year meeting and some extension classes may also occur during this additional time.

### **Parent/carers and visitor expectations**

After consultation with our school P&C and teachers, I am happy to publish for parents/carers a document outlining parent/carers expectations. This document will be included with this newsletter and aims to assist parent/carers in identifying the most appropriate ways to make contact with the school and teachers regarding their child. The document also identifies expectations for the behaviour of parents/carers and visitors when on site.

### Parent/Carer and Visitor Expectations

It is necessary to have procedures and protocols that will help solve problems or clarify issues as soon as possible to maintain a harmonious and safe school environment. The best results are achieved from working together.

- Express concern about alleged actions of own child(ren) or other students
- Enquire about school policy or practice
- Express concerns about the alleged actions of staff or volunteers.

Actions of other students	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Contact the class teacher or Head Teacher of the subject for a classroom problem.</li> <li>• Contact Deputy Principal for playground or school bus issues.</li> </ul>
School Policy or Practice	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Contact Office. State nature of concern and make an appointment to see the Deputy Principal or Principal.</li> <li>• P&amp;C meetings can also be a forum for consideration of policy.</li> </ul>
Actions of a staff member	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• For minor matters, contact the staff member or their Head Teacher directly to clarify concerns.</li> <li>• For more serious matters, contact the Deputy Principal or Principal and state concerns.</li> </ul>

#### Parents/Carers and visitors are expected to:

- Treat all persons associated with the school with respect and courtesy
- Make appointments in advance of expecting to obtain an interview
- Allow staff to supervise and manage students without interference
- Never approach students in the school with a view to making allegations against or threatening students
- Discuss issues or concerns about the school, staff or students through the correct procedures (as outlined above)
- Follow school procedures governing entry and behaviour on school grounds (No smoking, consumption of alcohol, being intoxicated, or using offensive language in the presence of students, staff or visitors). Please note that it is a work health and safety requirement for all persons entering onto the school grounds to first obtain a visitors pass from the Administration office, accessible via the Nile Street entrance to the school.

In those cases where people wishing to express concerns do so in an **offensive, aggressive, threatening or violent manner**, the Principal (or nominee) has the legal authority to:

- Terminate any phone conversation or meeting
- Direct the person to **immediately leave** the school grounds
- Call the Police to remove the person should he/she refuse
- Withdraw permission (by letter) for the person to enter the grounds without the Principal's permission and/or subsequently limit that person's contact with school staff.
- Seek further legal avenues.

## 2022 A YEAR OF FOCUS ON ATTENDANCE

This year we have had a strong focus on attendance and in particular, students attending a minimum of 90% of the time. That may sound like a lot, but a huge body of evidence and research shows us that attendance below 90% has a significant impact on students' development, school engagement and overall academic achievement.

If a student missed just 10% of their total schooling that equated to over a year and half, away from school! In high school the numbers are even more alarming, students with attendance below 90% have significantly more trouble engaging in class, achieving quality results and even with their social development.

The bottom line is that the more students attend school the better their school life will be. 90% is not a pass mark, it's a minimum expectation and we really try hard to encourage, recognise and reward students who meet this minimum standard for each Term and now, for the entire Year!

This year we have over 320 students who have achieved better than 90% attendance for the entire year, that's over a third of the school! An even smaller but just as significant number is the 22 students who will end 2022 with 100% attendance!

If your child is one of the students with attendance above 90% for the Year, we will be inviting them to watch Black Panther 2 - Wakanda Forever on Friday, December 2nd, for free! We will be taking those 320 students and giving them a free choc top and popcorn as well as the movie as our way to thank them for taking the important steps they can to achieve their best possible academic successes: just turn up to school more than 90% of the time!

Keep an eye out in school bags for permission notes over the next few weeks.

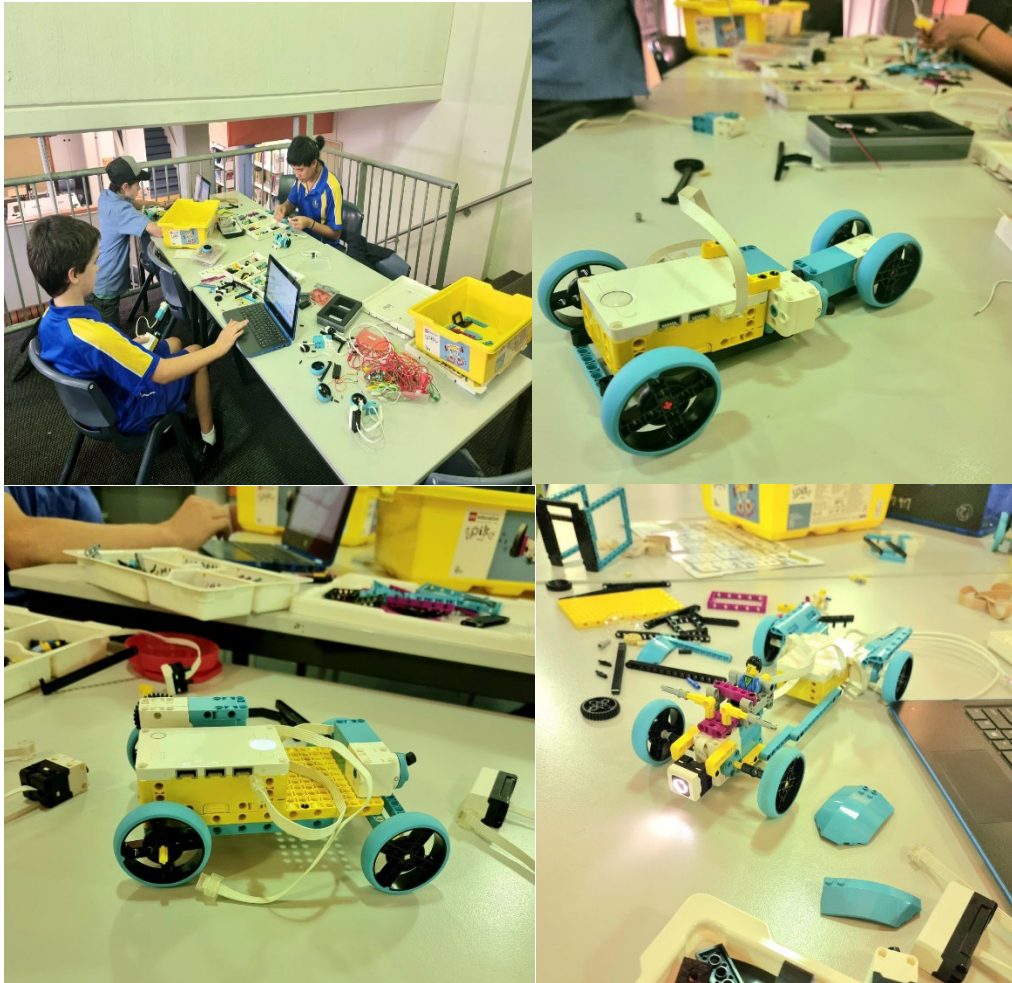

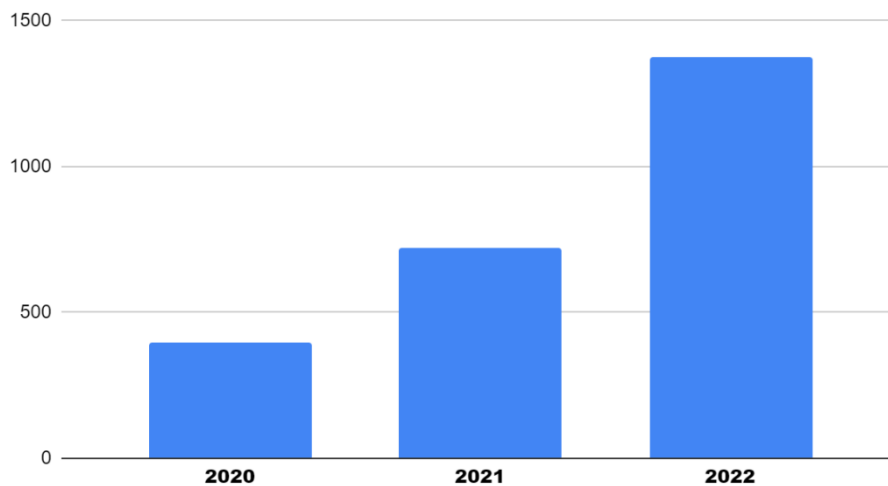
## YEAR 7 READING PROGRAM

## DUNGEONS AND DRAGONS GROUP

After lots of requests and interest, we finally have our D&D club up and running! In our introductory session, students were taken through how to play, the rules of the game, main objectives and character creation. It is wonderful to see students working collaboratively and applying critical and creative thinking skills. Research has demonstrated that D&D has many positive impacts on student learning, including enhancing social-emotional skills as well as stimulating intellectual curiosity and academic growth. David Simpkins, professor at the Rochester Institute of Technology found a strong correlation between role-playing games and learning, including, noting:

*"Dungeons & Dragons, and other narrative role playing games of its kind, provide many opportunities for learning. Participation in narrative role play can open up interests in topics such as mathematics, science, history, culture, ethics, critical reading, and media production. When D&D and its cousins are played in an inviting, encouraging, compassionate, and intellectually engaged environment, play opens the door to truly amazing possibilities for learning."*

## HSC MINIMUM STANDARDS NUMERACY TEST

Year 10 students will be undertaking their HSC Minimum Standards Numeracy test term 4. This will be done during their Mathematics lesson during weeks 4, 5 and 6. Their teacher will let them know when this will occur.

The HSC minimum standard Numeracy test is a 45min online task. Students will only need to bring a pen as they will be provided with working paper and the calculator comes up on the screen for calculator approved questions.

To have successfully met the requirements of the test students need to reach a level 3 or 4. If they don't they will have another opportunity next year.

### Reading, writing and numeracy — skills for everyday life



The HSC minimum standard has been introduced to ensure students have the reading, writing and numeracy skills needed for everyday life, work and further study.

#### What this means for students

Students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show they meet this standard, students need to achieve Level 3 in short online reading, writing and numeracy tests. Schools will help students to decide when they are ready to take each test. Students get four chances a year to sit each test, from Year 10 up to five years after starting their first HSC course.

Only students who meet the HSC minimum standard will receive an HSC testamur.

#### Provisions and exemptions

Students do not need to meet the HSC minimum standard to:

- study HSC courses
- sit HSC exams
- receive HSC assessment and exam results
- receive an ATAR
- receive a Record of School Achievement.

Provisions are available for some students with disability. Some students with a disability studying Life Skills courses may also be exempt from meeting the minimum standard to receive their HSC testamur.

## School Travel

### Term 4 2022

#### 2023 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2023 open from **Monday 10 October 2022**.

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2023 can [apply](#) now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should [renew or update](#) their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and entitlements remain valid for the start of the 2023 school year.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new [eligibility criteria](#), we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

[Term Bus Pass](#) holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

## Travel from Term 1 2023

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2023 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2022, so parents/students can [apply](#) or [update](#) details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their [local bus operator](#) to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.
